Connecting the dots on sustainability and resilience

9–11 April 2025, University of Latvia, Riga

While sustainability is about building a better future, resilience is about overcoming internal and external challenges. Crucially, both elements are needed for universities to succeed in today's world.

The 2025 EUA Annual Conference, hosted by the University of Latvia in Riga from 10–11 April, will strive to define what sustainability and resilience, as multi-faceted concepts, mean for universities. By 'Connecting the dots on sustainability and resilience', this event will explore how universities can contribute to a more sustainable future, both on and off campus, while strengthening institutional and societal resilience. So, how can university leadership and communities best pursue sustainability and resilience as key objectives of institutional missions, strategies and activities?

To reflect on this, the 2025 Annual Conference will explore what sustainability means from the point of view of funding, digitalisation, academic careers and university leadership. Sessions will also shine a spotlight on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), showcasing how they can be put into action by universities. At the same time, participants will reflect on how institutions can become resilient without turning inwards on themselves, in sessions dedicated to knowledge security and inclusion.

13.30-14.40	Plenary Session 1 <i>Universities' role in and for sustainability</i> Universities are central actors for sustainability. They are centres of knowledge creation and debate, they play an important part in innovation ecosystems, and they cultivate and transfer critical and creative thinking as well as concrete skills. Ten years after the Sustainable Development Goals were set by the United Nations, (how) have universities contributed to achieving them? This plenary session explores how universities are approaching this challenge at the institutional level, giving voice to university leaders and key partners.

15.10-16.10	Breakout session 1A <i>Inclusion through digitalisation</i> The integration of digital technologies in education has the potential to transform experiences in teaching and learning. As tools become more accessible, intuitive and adaptive, the possibility of tailoring content and personalising learning pathways to meet the needs of the individual learner becomes more easily achievable. This session will demonstrate how new technologies can transform traditional practices, thereby creating opportunities for participation among a more diverse profile of learners and enhancing universities' role in providing quality education for all. Presentations will showcase how digitalisation has supported inclusive learning spaces and environments. Breakout session 1B <i>Scholar-led publishing models: a risky business</i> The landscape of scholarly communication is undergoing significant transformations driven by digital advancements, evolving business models and a growing emphasis on openness. Navigating this moving landscape is challenging for universities, because of inherent tensions between different – and sometimes incompatible – demands. This session will address pressing issues for universities when it comes to scholarly communication, such as rising costs, mandates for open access by policy makers and research funders and a research culture still driven by the 'publish or perish' mantra. Breakout session 1C <i>Leading sustainable transformation</i> This breakout session will examine the pivotal role of transformational leadership in guiding universities' shift towards a comprehensive approach to sustainability. By addressing concrete leadership dilemmas, it will explore how institutions have reimagined their vision and governance structures, moving towards a transversal institutional strategy. Drawing on the experiences of university leaders, this session will focus on how leaders can align their institutions with new sustainability goals, navigate tensions and engage stakeholders at all levels, as well as how their universities have restructured governance models, allocated additional resources (financial and human), or

	created new leadership roles and bodies to holistically address sustainability across the university.

16.50-17.50	<p>Plenary session 2</p> <p><i>Towards sustainable and attractive academic careers</i></p> <p>Sustainable and attractive academic careers are a cornerstone of competitive higher education and research. This plenary session marks the launch of EUA's key principles for sustainable and attractive academic careers, created by a dedicated task-and-finish group over the course of the past year. Participants will have the opportunity to learn more about the principles and engage in a discussion about how they can be implemented in a context-sensitive way.</p>

09.30-10.30	<p>Breakout session 2A <i>Risk and resilience in knowledge security</i></p> <p>Discussions on knowledge security have ranged from the culture of risk awareness in universities to frameworks and tools for managing risks in balanced, yet effective ways. As policy makers explore ever more targeted measures to ensure security and autonomy in key R&I areas, the university sector faces critical choices in terms of capacity building for responsible internationalisation. As these choices bring major consequences for institutional resilience and the sustainability of scientific partnerships, this session will assess how universities are managing risks and threats to their knowledge assets.</p> <p>Breakout session 2B <i>Sustainable income diversification strategies</i></p> <p>Many universities set up strategies to diversify their income sources, and therefore lessen their financial dependence towards a single funder (most often, public authorities), whose reliability can no longer be taken for granted. However, income diversification comes with its own set of challenges and demands adequate risk management strategies. This session will address how universities must take various risks into account, such as volatile political and economic environments (e.g. risks connected to attracting foreign students), ethical questions (from whom do we accept funds), financial risks (co-funding) and the perceptions of different communities (staff, students, partner organisations).</p> <p>Breakout session 2C <i>Beyond greening: putting the SDGs into action</i></p> <p>Sustainability is high on the agenda of European universities. Institutions frame sustainability in diverse ways, with some focusing on greening, and others taking a much broader view. There is also much to be learned from how the higher education sector addresses sustainability in day-to-day activities, across all university missions. Through a peer learning approach, this session will explore how universities are currently translating their strategies on the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and greening into concrete actions.</p>

11.10-12.10	<p>Plenary Session 3</p> <p><i>Universities and the future EU programmes for a sustainable and resilient Europe</i></p>

	<p>2025 is set to be a pivotal year for research, innovation and higher education in Europe, as the European Commission will present its proposal for the next Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF), setting the EU's budgetary priorities for 2028-2034. Alongside this, the Commission will outline the future of programmes critical to universities, notably Horizon Europe and Erasmus+. With various priorities competing to shape the EU's political agenda into the future, this session will explore possible directions for the next generation of EU funding programmes in research, innovation and higher education. Through a panel discussion, speakers will reflect on how upcoming EU policy priorities and funding programmes can adequately address the needs of universities in these areas to empower them to continue playing their critical role in fostering a sustainable and resilient Europe.</p>
